HIGH PRICES FOR LUMBER; PAY REDUCED

Lumber Trust Makes Huge Profits

(The Federal Trade Commission has issued a report that the logging camps of northern Wisconsin and Michigan make possible the huge profits being made by lumber companies in selling close to 100 per cent above the pre-war price level while the workers get only from \$40 to \$60 a month, with emphasis on the lower figure.

The wages of these workers increased slightly in February when the companies failed to get enough men to work for the low rates paid in January. According to reports to the Northern Lumber and Hardwood Association, who employ 10,000 loggers, swamper and roadmen in northern Michigan get increases ranging from \$1 to \$2 a day, while the workers in the Wisconsin bay shore district show increases of from \$1 to \$4 a month.

The report shows wages of common labor at the mills in northern Michigan are averaging \$3.50 a day, while in the Bay Shore and eastern Wisconsin districts the labor is getting from \$2.73 to \$3.75 a day with an average of \$3.40. Swamper wages are \$2.50 a month.

Militant Negroes On Picket Line: Put Scab Issue Before Churches

Success attends the opening of the campaign which colored girl strikers are waging to prevent the furnishing of scabs to the garment houses.

At a rousing meeting of colored girl militants at 180 W. Washington street yesterday announcement was made that one of the largest Negro movement agencies had promised to send no scabs into the strike zone. Vigorous picketing work by the colored and Negro volunteers from other industries was also reported.

The committees which was elected to get the co-operation of the colored church leaders that they would not furnish scabs to the strike, the stand that they will not help defeat the workers in their fight. But they had to face the fact that the scabs were being sent to the strike zone by the fact that there was a strike on the dress and waist industry. Letter to Churches.
The letter follows:

"We call your attention to the fact that at present there is a strike of garment workers in the garment industry. The strikers are demanding a ten per cent increase in salary and forty hours a week.

"There are a large number of colored girls in the union and they along with the colored men are to the cause of organized labor. For they find that only their organization can help them and the colored men who when not in the unions, is the most exploited and oppressed, probably.

"The greatest blow to the cause of the strikers at this moment is the conduct of the garment industry. The colored girls, who are now being brought into the shop to defeat the strikers. These girls are being used by the garment industry and the agencies on the south side. This is unfair to the union girls of both sides.

"The colored girls, who have contributed more to the state of antagonism existing between the two sides, are the ones who are being used. The colored girls, who have come out on the picket line and have been picketed by the police, reported that she had a talk with a white detective who had been assigned to the picket line. "He told me that he did not want to see us walking on the street with colored girls," she said.

Protest Bravely.
The treatment we colored girls get at the hands of the police may be accounted for by the fact that the police are not in sympathy with the colored union girls. We know that the militant colored girls are not out on the picket line and have been picketed by the police.

"We are kindly asking you to give this condition your most earnest consideration. The girls in their ardent struggle by advising your congregation to aid the employers to determine which by sending colored girls to take the jobs of the strikers.
