Repudiate LaFollette;
Will War on Klan

(Special to the DAILY WORKER)
SAN FRANCISCO, July 14.—

The Farmer-Labor Party of California repudiated the endorsement of LaFollette at a special meeting of the state committee Sunday, and voted to get behind the campaign for William Z. Foster and Ben Gitlow, Workers Party nominees.

Supporters of George Kidwell, were checkmated at the convention. Kidwell, original F.-L. candidate, seized the first opportunity after the Cleveland convention announcements to declare himself for LaFollette and throw overboard the national Farmer-Labor committee, but the committee reversed his action.

Kidwell supporters were also defeated in the election of the California Farmer-Labor Party of the United States, which recently received a mortal wound at the hands of John Fitzpatrick.

A determined fight for the revolutionary candidates will be made up and down the state. Speakers will invade the reaction ruled communities and the Klan will be exposed. The message that the towns strung along the San Joaquin and Sacramento valleys, Capitalist literature will follow the slogan of the revolution. The banner will be fought on an uncompromising revolutionary basis. It will carry the sheer message of the class struggle that can only end when the working class has supplanted its exploiters.

For Class War Prisoners.

A fierce assault on the revolutionaries under the Klan's machinations will be made by the forces directing the proletarian campaign. These persecutions, which have been almost entirely directed at the Industrial Workers of the World, but will have also hit at militant A. F. of L. unionists, will be mercilessly assailed. The connection will be broken between the proletarian and the industrial lumber trust, big power concerns, such as the Edison company, and dominant financial interests.

The Massacre, Wm. K. Billeaud, Ford, Sub and all the other class war prisoners not included in the Klan's list will be fought as an act of revolution and the revolutionaries' hypocritical attitude toward these men will furnish abundant campaign fuel.

The dedication for Foster and Gitlow has already aroused responses which indicate the possibilities of the campaign. The Workers Party drive will be resisted by the demagogic forces that now exists in the old parties. William Johnson's fight against Coolidge for the White House spoils em, plus the other old parties who are the California G. O. P. The Jackson party has been weakened by the McAdoo feds. The Meados had in the meantime lost the state. Demagogic forces at Madison Square Garden, many of his followers are disgusted at his subsequent support of John W. Davis, the Morgan lawyer.

Needless to say, the Ku Klux Klan will be attacked with vigor. This Fascist organization, whose strength is very great in the South, has been running to extreme excess in the last few months, of which the recent violence in San Pedro is just a sample.

LaFollette's failure to declare against the Klan has aroused the anger of many workmen, and is an important count in the indictment of his candidacy as non-working class movement.

HARVESTER CO. LAUGHS AT ALL ANTI-TRUST LAW

Legislation a Joke Big Morgan Firm

FIFTH ARTICLE.

While its costly legal staff has continually warded off suits by the United States and various state governments, chagrin g them with unfair competitive practices, the International Harvester company, by paying low wages and raising farm machinery prices to the limit has increased its profit by leaps and bounds.

In the year 1923 the International Harvester paid out \$11,167,576.00 in dividends, which was the net profit of the company.

The International Harvester company makes not only binders and tractors but it also manufactures motor vehicles, gasoline engines, hay rakes, grain elevators, farm sledges, tethers, hay-loaders, mowers, and every conceivable kind of farm implements and farm machinery. It also makes lawn mowers, generators, and electric motors. The International has absolute control over the prices charged on all farm equipment.

Three Men Rule 50,000.

Farmers have been banded together and sued the Morgan trust for unfair practices, and have won verdicts in some states such as Missouri, Indiana, and Illinois. In these suits represented that George W. Morgan, chairman of the board of directors of J. P. Morgan, selected the entire board of directors of the company and placed the power to vote all of the stock in the hands of J. P. Morgan, himself, Diering, and Cyrus McCormick. The control of freight rates, wages to thirty thousand employees, prices that are far above the cost to 50 per cent of the American farmers, are in the hands of three men.

Doheny, who got the California Naval Oil reserves when Sinclair got "Teepot Dome," and by Walter Clark Teagle, president of Standard Oil, are planning to come to Mexico before the end of the month to attempt to influence Obregon before he leaves office. The newspaper "Excelsior" claims to have this from reliable sources.

The group of oil magnates are going to urge that Mexico change her constitution so that the oil companies can make more money. The Mexican constitution does not allow permanent possession of mineral and oil resources and considerably restricts foreign production from subsoil resources.

The American oil magnates are playing a wily game with Mexico. They are trying to force the bankers not to grant Mexico any loan until Obregon assures them that the right legislation will be enacted to give the oil exploiters free rein again.

EDUCATION WEEK SHOWS HOW BOSS CONTROLS SCHOOL

U. S. Children Taught
Fear of Revolution

No better expression of what American education stands for could be found than that embodied in the Program for American Education Week, November 12 to 16, 1924, formulated by the National Education Association. This program has received the approval of President Coolidge.

It is to be assumed that the program for American Education Week is our national educational program in miniature. America is called upon to provide "better training and better opportunities for all, building up illiteracy by 1930." "A playground for every child," "Education in the home"—in short, "in the classroom.

Teach Open-mindedness, revolution.

However valuable these high-sounding aims may appear, they must be interpreted and applied solely in the light of their function and underlying purpose. The program gives this purpose in strong and unmistakable terms. The schools are to be used to "stamp out revolutionaries. Communists and extreme pacifists are a menace." The red flag means death, destruction, anarchy, communism, and dictatorship. "Stamp out revolutionary radicalism." "The red flag—danger."

Communists are urged to hold mass meetings. Requests for speakers are to be made to the American Legion posts throughout the country.

Never Challenge Wage Slavery. American children are to be trained to shun and avoid that education which holds forth the only prospect of salvation. Under the present system of capitalist slavery, the schools were used to enlist the willing sacrifice of the youth of the nation to the horrors of the World War. The schools are to be used to rivet more firmly the chains of capitalism on its wage slaves.

SICK SOCIALIST LEADER HAS LOST PAGE IN POLITICS

Dobe Out of Touch; Tries to Hold Party

Marxine V. Dobe, sick and in seclusion in a sanitarium at Elmhurst, Illinois, predicted from talk with political leaders that his party, the Socialist, would be politically resurrected to keep the rank and file of the rank and file of the party. Dobe, however, would like to keep in touch with the party as he wishes to serve in his role as mentor to the socialist cause.

In a letter to the DAILY WORKER reporter, Dobe says: "Sorry I did not get to see you. I am still under treatment. The doctors will tell you how nice to see the many visitors would be glad to see if my condition permitted. I cannot be interviewed at present."

Tries to Smile Two Ways.

Dobe telegrams to the national convention of the socialist party as a conciliatory one. Incapable of taking an active part in politics, he is unable to be the impotency of informing Larivette and remaining a Marxist. Dobe takes a blind stab to please both sides. While no non-socialist delegates Dobe, "he is the only one who can keep the socialist party in the party of his working class."

Dobe is trying to play an impossible role. He is a socialist leader with leaders in the radical movement the burning questions which confront the working class, but refusing to any interviews on the grounds that he is physically unable. Forbidden Interviews.

At the Lindner health resort at Elmhurst, the doctor decided "Mr. Dobe is a socialist leader, to see anyone except his immediate family. When he came here a month ago we laid down the strict rule that Mr. Dobe was not to be interviewed. He is slowly recovering from a complete nervous and physical breakdown."

The doctor refused to give Dobe a house, doctor, and a place to live, communications, visits from friends, and political discussions. *sep* Dobe's strength.

In order to keep in touch with the political situation Dobe goes up to town to Elmhurst, a half a mile from the sanitarium, receives his mail at the post office, and comes back to his political associates against his doctor's orders. The Elmhurst Press declares that Mr. Dobe "has been doing his best to keep the party in the streets, but refuses to talk politics and is taking a vacation from politics, as one Elmhurst resident put it, until he becomes stronger."

Listen to LaFollette.

But it is LaFollette, the Socialist, Milwaukee, LaFollette, Dobe taking no vacation from politics when it comes to supporting a middle class candidate. "Mr. Dobe was all smiles when he was interviewed by a reporter named by the Socialist Party national committee to convey greetings of the convention to Mr. Larivette's administration," says the Socialist press.

"He expressed the conviction that the Socialist Party would have thrown away the opportunity of a generation by withholding its support from the LaFollette candidacy."

Dobe made a phony, according to the LaFollette press, with the following: "We believe that the workers can work together in the labor party which should be organized next January."

Dobe sides with the General Federation of Labor, the socialist, Farrington plan of class collaboration. He supports LaFollette, the man with an unswerving labor record, admittedly supporting the socialist manufacturers, but refuses to answer the workers' questions or discuss politics with any other than the right wing, middle class leadership of the dying Socialist party.

Our Democracy

The Communists entering the presidential election campaign will have an impressive opportunity to point out one of the features of American democracy that has been entirely overlooked or hidden.

The monstrous growth of the machinery, American capitalist democracy, is appalling to the student of political affairs. The governmental payroll now embraces one out of every twelve persons gainfully employed. There are close to three and a half million people on the government payroll at the annual cost of almost four billion dollars. This number is three times as many as the total employed in the entire mining industry; a greater number than those in the steam and electric railways of the country; five times as many as those employed in mining, and six times the number of those working in the production of iron and steel and the running of the foundry and machine shops.

In the last two decades the number of federal government employees has increased one hundred per cent. At the same time the number of workers engaged in gainful occupations has increased only ten per cent. In 1901 there were only three government employees operating at an annual cost of less than a million dollars. Today there are less than thirty-four such bureaucratic committees sustained at an annual cost of six hundred fifty million dollars.

What a staggering price the operation of the huge governmental apparatus, used with unfeeling regularity against the working masses demands, is reflected in the fact that the total cost is equivalent to a sum sufficient to meet the pay rolls of the automobile industry. The annual government payroll alone would suffice to sustain every branch of agriculture in the country; five times as many as those employed in mining, and six times the number of those working in the production of iron and steel and the running of the foundry and machine shops.

Paleolithic Politics

It is small wonder that the vast majority of workers in the trade unions take no interest in political action. This is threatening the success of the Len Small-labor combination, which requires the elimination of such "independents" in the state elections. So this is dicker for LaFollette's influence to keep the independents out of Illinois in favor of the class struggle.
