

EUROPEAN SOCIALISTS DEVELOPING PROGRAMS

TURNING TOWARD SPARTACAN

AND BOLSHEVIST POSITION

Programs of Socialists Factions Analyzed.

HOME—"In Italy, as elsewhere, the various socialist factions have different views. The Maximalists are represented by the group, The Maximalists, the Left, the Right, and the Parliamentary group. The Maximalists have the following program as follows: (1) To refrain from co-operation with the Right in order to kindle the revolutionary energy of the masses; (2) To support the organization of the proletariat as the organ of the administration; the new socialist order; (3) The application of the principle of socialism as the basis of the organization of the Socialist Republic; (4) Adoption of a program of political and economic power, and the defense of the proletariat as the basis for carrying out socialist measures of revolution. The principal aim of their program is to bring about the dissolution of the power of the bourgeoisie and the concentration of all the forces of the proletariat in the party; (5) The party, in advocating an intensive struggle, demands strict party discipline.

The program of the Right demands that the party demands a rapid demand for amnesty, the restoration of the right to strike, the right to organize, the recall of all troops from Russia, the right to self-determination, and the right to be convinced that the proletariat is not yet ripe enough to take the responsibility for the administration of the state. They therefore consider the dictatorship of the proletariat as a dangerous and dangerous until the masses have attained a high level of class consciousness. They advocate an intensive propaganda, the struggle of the collectivists versus individualism. They have close contact with the Socialist party in the International Socialist movement.

The Parliamentary group has agreed on the following program: (1) To demand that the Parliamentary system should be maintained; (2) To demand that the party should be the party of the people; (2) To protest against the attitude of the Right towards the Russian Revolution; (3) To demand that the party should be the party of the people; (4) The abolition of the centralized state; (5) The defense of those condemned on political grounds; (6) Approval of Trotski's project for a proportional representation system for workmen.

In the Italian Chamber, Laborists vitally attacked the League of Nations.

The Bolshevik regime in Russia and among the workers has been severely directed against it. There have been large demonstrations of protest against intervention in Turkey by Italian troops.

Sergeant of Avanil, has been set at liberty; he was welcomed by the workers. The Italian government, day by day is spoken in favor of a total alliance with the Bolsheviks and against intervention in Russia.

FRENCH SOCIALISTS MAKE RADICAL DEMANDS

PARIS—"The committee of the French Socialist party—for reconstituting the party—has prepared the following program for submission to the national convention to be held: (1) The capitalist bourgeoisie, the bankers, the industrialists, the middle class, will never consent voluntarily to the destruction of the system which in their hands constitutes the most oppressive instrument of domination and exploitation. The revolution which will really create the new society must be placed in a position of the most complete independence, in order to be able to develop its full development of his facilities.

The party demands the subordination to the proletarian masses and calls upon the masses to realize the following program:

"The socialists demand by the proletariat, (1) the organization of the workers' and peasant's councils; (2) the nationalization of the means of production; (3) the socialization of the means of production; (4) socialization of the means of production; (5) the nationalization of the industries, mines, transportation, real estate, banks, insurance companies, peasants, workers, miners, transport workers, sailors, etc.; (6) the nationalization of the property of the workers and the peasants; etc.; (5) distribution of the product created by means of collective labor among the store-houses under the control of the workers' and peasant's councils; (6) the entire bureaucracy under the direct control of the workers' and peasant's councils; (7) the union of the all proletarian republic in the Socialist International.

COMMENT AND CRITICISM.

The League of Nations is in a bad way. The published covenant has only been a disappointment among the liberals and a complete victory for the radicals, while the reactionaries are interested in the League of Nations, in torturing it to their own sinister purposes.

J. A. Hobson in the London Nation says that the League of Nations is a "league of peace and war." It is a collection of autocratic states designed to hold down the revolutionaries by superior economic and military force. The League of Nations will not bring with a breath of democracy in its atmosphere. The League of Nations General on Tressel, corresponding to the League of Nations of Labor, has started a Party with a program demanding it as a "league of peace." It has no war friends, nor even
